This year we were awarded a \$5,200 grant from The Preservation League of NYS to undertake a building condition and engineering survey of the historic Heintzleman Library. What an important step to preserve the rich history of the Town of Horicon for future generations!

## 1881 Church-Museum Update

In our spring Newsletter, we reported on construction underway to save the historic former church in Adirondack - built in 1881 for reuse as an Annex to the Historical Museum in Brant Lake. A new \$66,000 concrete foundation was installed replacing the failed original stone foundation and the Architect's final construction plans to make the building code-compliant including plumbing, electrical and handicap access were being prepared for competitive public bidding.



The Horicon Town Board awarded the \$65,000 construction contract at its October 18<sup>th</sup> meeting. Construction is already underway inside the church. All new roofing materials are onsite for the new roof installation, weather permitting, is now being installed. All remaining work including separately bid new drilled water well is to be completed by spring. The Museum Annex opening, joining our long-existing Museum in Brant Lake, is expected this coming warm weather season.

# Remembering Andrew F. Jones (1883-1958) A Key Figure in the Town of Horicon

Andrew F. Jones, a local businessman, was a major source of employment in the Town of Horicon from the early 1900's through the mid 1950's.

From a small home at the foot of Brant Lake, he built Stonehurst on Elbow Corner. He and his wife Bertha "Belle" Bruce Jones rented rooms and served three meals daily to vacationers; especially those interested in fishing Brant Lake. Their youngest son, Lloyd "Bud" served as a guide when he was only 8 years old. Many of the couples who stayed at Stonehurst fell in love with the area and had summer homes built by Andrew and his crews. Two employees that came down from West Chazy, New York met the loves of their lives while working for Jones. They married a " local" and settled in the Town of Horicon. You may recognize these names:

Leon & Lena Mae (Hayes) Randlett (married 1938) and William & Evelyn (Naar) Bennett (married 1934). Andrew sold Stonehurst in the mid 40's to George Culver. The property has been through a few owners since. An entire article could be written on the tales at Stonehurst (now called Stoneleigh).

After sawmill accident

His sawmill and shop was located near the old Elbow School on Route 8. That was where a substantial amount of the material used for building was produced. In 1938, Andy actually cut off his thumb and index finger while prepping a job's lumber in that sawmill.

Andrew logged the timberlands, had his own sand and gravel banks and bought farm property stone walls for his masonry business. He turned the Elbow School into rental apartments. One of his first tenants was Bill and Evie Bennett.

Andy enjoyed the farming business with dairy deliveries plus his maple sugar bush and selling various maple products. In the 50's, his gardens were flourishing and the grandchildren loved to sneak into the strawberry fields for afternoon snacks. That was supposed to be off limits but my guess is that he knew.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones raised their own three children; daughter Beatrice, sons Leon (Tim) and Lloyd (Bud). They also added two young boys to the mix; Bill Bennett and nephew Bill Bruce Sr. They had nine granddaughters and one grandson. That was a challenge in itself. On their birthdays, he would take each one with him to Cronin's Store (Brunette's & last known as Daby's). Gramp would buy them new shoes and 25 cents worth of penny candy. Those were special Grandfather times.

# The YMCA Adirondack Center Signature Programs



No More Learning Gap is a summer reading program that runs six weeks for students entering 1st-3rd grade which is sponsored by the Adirondack Foundation. The goal is to build better readers and prevent the loss of skills that can take place each summer. The hope is to also develop positive self-esteem in a safe, supervised, and interactive learning environment.

In the summer of 2018 there were 21 students enrolled in this program, 86% of them improved their reading and 100% of them knew more site words by the end of summer!

The Y Achievers program is offered to students in grades 6th-10th after school and provides a safe environment for tweens and teens to be with friends while participating in a variety of activities. Activities offered are recreation, STEAM, homework time including tutoring and more. This program currently includes North Warren, Minerva and Warrensburg schools.

We believe no one should be denied program participation solely because of the inability to pay fees. Financial assistance applications are available at the center and is granted based on available resources.
